Dear Friends of the Ashland Community Kitchen,

Noticing Jeremy holding his back at the end of the hallway, I asked him if he was alright. He smiled and said, "Yes, my back hurts from sleeping in my tent last night." I had met Jeremy over a year ago, as he was one of the many guests that entered our dining hall daily.

For some reason, I assumed he stayed at the Salvation Army or, by now, an apartment. I was taken back to find out that he still lived in a tent on the city's outskirts. For the past six months, Jeremy had been coming in once a week to sweep the floors, wash dishes, or put up boxes of inventory for us. I had known a little about his story but that day I was determined to learn more. He shared with me that by the age of fifteen, both his adoptive parents had passed away, and he found himself traveling from house to house before he entered the streets for the first time. A decade and a half later he would be dropped off in Ashland by a mental hospital where he had stayed for a time because of depression, anxiety, and lack of coping mechanisms. As he shared this part of his story, he became emotional, and I tried to cut off the conversation, feeling bad that I pressed into his pain. Still, he wanted to continue to share his story. In doing so, he expressed his thankfulness for the Ashland Community Kitchen as a lifeline in restoring his self-respect by enabling him to give back to the organization that gave to him daily. Sadly, Jeremy's story is not unique. While the name and circumstances change, the information is one of the same, a need, Ashland Community Kitchen answering, and donors supporting both. Since 1983, the Ashland Community Kitchen has served more than 500,000 meals and 27,000+ meals this year.

While Covid-19 has forced us to adapt to changing governmental regulations, we have never missed a day serving those living below the poverty line. In fact, in the midst of one of the darkest times in our communities history, we expanded serving others through our new pantry program, which houses our Senior and Community Box programs. The Senior Box Program is a USDA administered program targeted to seniors living in poverty. In contrast, the Community Box Program is open to any needy person or family that needs a helping hand. Through our three-pronged programmatic approach (Soup Kitchen, Senior Box, and Community Box), we are making sure that no one goes hungry in our community.

Thank you for supporting us so that we can keep helping so many in need.

does the competition raise money for charities simply by totaling steps, it gets students up and moving. Watching an app track my steps is surprisingly motivating to get me to take extra ones throughout the day and to see how many miles I can accomplish. Recently, I've been walking as I pray for our youth and kids, and I've been reflecting on the many steps Jesus took during His lifetime. I wonder what it would have been like to be one of His disciples who walked with Him everywhere He went?

While walking was the primary mode of transportation for commoners in Jesus' day, and my primary mode of transportation to work my first two years in California, it sometimes feels too slow for me. One of my college summers at Aldersgate, I remember running across camp and someone calling out: "Is everything okay?" "Yes!" I shouted back, continuing toward my destination, "Running's just quicker than walking!" I don't like being slowed down, and sometimes walking to get to a destination just feels too slow. It takes time. Yet sometimes that's all God asks of us—our time. As I've been praying and walking in the sanctuary recently, I feel a new spiritual discipline emerging for me. I feel God is calling me to ready my walking feet for an adventure with Him.



Keep on praying! I do plan to go North in December. You may recall that my passport expired on August 24th and the Embassy was closed until October or later. BUT I found out that the Embassy opened.

Really my Deanna wrote a letter to them, told them her aged mother needed a

passport, etc! She sent a copy to me and I called and now have an appointment on December 3rd to apply for my passport. It should be ready, they said, about December 15th so I am getting things in order here. God knows how to get it done!!!

You know I have the extra monetary responsibilities in December with the 13th month of pay and all the vehicles expire their plates and inspection. So things stay busy. I am thankful I have been able to keep the boys working full time. They need the income for their families, you know. God has been good.

Wilber was having Sunday morning services in the dining hall. I told the DS Douglas. He told the Bishop and they have stopped the services here. The reason they say is the Ministry of Public Health has to give the Churches permission. Of course, since Wilber is not in the Methodist Church now – they had cut him off totally, salary, no pension, they had to move from the house at the Meth. School to their own house, fortunately they had bought a lot in Sta Rosa de La Palmera and had a place to go, living more or less in a tent with a bathroom which we had helped to build earlier, thank God... So no one is using the Camp. I told Douglas to get the documents in order before the teams come in 2021. SO...

Yes, this offering will surely help me pay the men here! They are doing wonderfully well and repairing so much as well as working on the gym building, little by little. They had to make scaffolding and that is done so they are welding the braces on the big metal pillars now. God has blessed us with these fellows, Dennis, Alexis, Geovanny, Pablo! No doubt about it! and you all are helping me to pay them. Last payday I had to use my own Social Security debit card but that was ok and possible. I spend that on fuel for my car and whatever food I get at the Super so God takes care of all!

Thank you for your message here! You all are amazing, and I am so thankful! Thank You! Geovanny is preparing a list of the materials needed for his mother's house. He is going to be on vacation the last two weeks of December but he will work on the house during that time. I asked him about some pictures and to prepare the material list.

I am to be on my way in the morning to the Embassy to apply for my passport, so this will be brief tonight, as I have to get ready for an early start. It has been so rainy and foggy, and I am sure it will be tomorrow again. My appointment is at 1:15 so I plan to leave here shortly after 8 a.m. There are so many large trucks on the roads and just takes time.

The Bishop has called a board meeting for Tuesday in Alajuela so I will return home tomorrow and prepare my reports for that, also.

There are not enough ways to say thank you for your offerings. Without your all's gift I can't imagine how I would keep these men at work! You all have blessed us all and we say thank you. The men have been busily maintaining the buildings, painting, routing out termites again this week in the back walls of the guest house. Today Geovanny was repairing and painting the benches for the Kioskos.

Thank you again for this generous gift for all here. I will write more about the VBS and Crafts upon my return tomorrow. I have your team's dates as Feb 6-14. That is just about the time school should start here. Love and prayers for everything! Mary and all
